The club's first meeting is held at Chris's parents' house. Eight people were present-some are still members today!





About 350 people went along to see the 50 models on display — and many were so impressed that they asked if they could become club members.


Said the club secretary, Mr. Christopher Warrell, of Beechill Road, Eltham: "The afternoon was a great success and we hope to make it an annual event."




